#### Sisal (Common Name)

Agave sisalana (Scientific Name)



#### **Alternative common names:**

Garingboom (Afrikaans)

Succulent shrub with thick, sword-shaped leaves in a basal rosette up to 2m high. The leaves are bright green with tiny toothed to smooth margins. Greenish yellow flowers are borne on a 5-6m tall flowering spike from December to March. Leaves are poisonous to animals and livestock.

### Where does this species come from?

Mexico

#### How does it spread?

Seeds and suckering. Suckering means that a new shoot grows out of the joint where the branch on the plant meets the stem.

## Why is it a problem?

It competes with indigenous species. Prolific suckering can create impenetrable thickets especially if it is left to spread, rendering the land useless for grazing. The leaves are poisonous to livestock.
